# What's New On The Slopes In Pensylvania for 2014-15!

Skiers and riders will see dynamic innovations on the Pennsylvania snow scene this season. Millions of dollars have been poured into resort improvements from parking lots to lodges, accommodations, lifts and summits. Web based technology will make buying discounted lift tickets as easy as clicking a mouse. Miles of hidden pipelines will fuel new automated snowmaking systems, and the latest in steep climbing groomers will put your skis and boards on ballroom conditions or challenging bumps. Take your pick. Now, let's take the tour.

#### THE EAST

If you've ever been annoyed by flapping tickets and passes, **JACK FROST** and **BIG BOULDER MOUNTAINS** have solved the problem for season pass holders. Scanners at the lifts will detect the pass wherever it's stowed. Look for big changes in the summit lodge of this "upside-down" mountain.

Sister mountain BIG BOULDER, a favorite with the surfing crowd has planted new state-of-the-art snow guns on some of the most popular cruising trails and terrain parks including Tannenbaum, Bunny Schuss and Love Park. The Tannenbaum lift has been replaced

New management at **ALPINE MOUNTAIN** will be cutting the ribbon on the only ski area ice rink in the Poconos this winter. Skiers and riders can bring along their skates or rent a pair there and take a few spins after a day running the mountain. Also look for the first ever Yuengling Bar and Grill as Pennsylvania's best known export caters to a home state crowd. A kitchen has been added to the bar for pub grub treats and three private lounges have been added to a completely transformed main lodge.

If all goes as planned, before the last runs of the new season, skiers and riders at **CAMELBACK MOUNTAIN** near Tannersville in the Poconos will have a brand new hotel to stay and play after a day on the slopes. With 453 rooms and easy access to the lifts, the luxury tinted hotel will feature a world class indoor water park, an array of restaurants, a bar and





spa. Opening expected in early March. For racers in the house, the popular adult racing program will expand with a new event

**SHAWNEE MOUNTAIN** has pumped millions into hi-tech snowmaking wizardry to smooth some of the most popular trails and slopes. While you sleep, over a mile of new piping is pulsing with the water and compressed air to create an automated blizzard. The computerized snow-making system boosts the ability of Shawnee snow farmers to make more snow, faster than ever. For gear to get on the mountain, the rental fleet has been dramatically expanded with over 1,200 new sets of high performance boots, boards and skis.

Lift ticket angst goes into the shredder at **BLUE MOUNTAIN** this winter. Only two types of lift tags are on the menu. No more rushing to get to this popular Pocono Mountain area. Then, a new 6-hour ticket lets you get every second you pay for. The clock doesn't start ticking until your first chair ride. Fine dining has been added to Blue's constantly advancing sipping and supping options. The new 450 seat eatery will offer eye-filling views of surrounding mountains and

the Vista ski trail, while serving up imaginative dishes from new kitchen facilities in the summit lodge. Rounding out the experience, look for a new lift in the Blue Mountain tubing park to improve access to 21 lanes of tubing action.






Ligety: Five Years Straight!



Ted Ligety came back to take the Audi FIS Ski World Cup giant slalom victory at Beaver Creek for the fifth straight year..



Plus, don't forget that Ligety was just over two weeks out from surgery on a fractured left wrist, with stitches plainly showing where four screws were inserted to stabilize the injury. "I was skiing for about a week without a pole because I couldn't really move my wrist much," said Ligety in his press conference. "But now it feels fine. I think in a way that was good practice for me. I think that helped my skiing a bit as well."

It was Ligety's 23rd giant slalom win, matching famed Michael von Grünigen from Switzerland, one of his childhood heroes. Next on the hit list is Ingemar Stenmark, who has 46 wins.

It was a strong day for the U.S. Ski Team with two other men scoring World Cup points. Tim Jitloff (Reno, NV) finished 11th the first run, and broke into the top 10 after the second run, grabbing ninth overall. Slalom-specialist David Chodounsky (Crested Butte, CO) had a phenomenal first run bibbo—starting 66th and making the flip in 29th. After a thrilling second run, Chodounsky pulled off a 17th place, throwing his arms up in the finish to celebrate his first World Cup GS points. "Running more GS was one of my biggest goals this year," said Chodounsky. "I'm really happy it's going well and that I have a second event."

### Quotes:

Any day you win a World Cup race is a good day, especially so on home soil—in front of the home crowd and friends and family. Second run was great. I was little frustrated after the first run; I didn't ski the way I wanted to. The second run, I was able to find the groove a little better.

Sölden didn't go great—it was more bad luck than anything anything It's nice to be here; this is a hill I'm really comfortable on.

#### **David Chodounsky**

I knew I was skiing well, coming off of a second place in the NorAm last week. I just came in here wanting to have fun—whatever happened happened. I knew I had a shot here to make it in the top 30, but I wasn't expecting it. I was just going to have fun. I took advantage and had a good run. I'm really happy.

Running 66th [first run], I expected it to be a little worse, a little bumpier. But the course actually held up really well. I just had to put my foot in the groove that was there and push off of it. I did that and made it down right in the nick of time. Second run, it was so smooth. I could are wherever I want to.

Running more GS was one of my biggest goals this year. I'm really happy it's going well and that I have a second event. My parents couldn't make it today; they're out of town. My mom is going to be really, really upset that she missed this!

#### Tim Jitloff

After Sölden and crushing it on the second run, I'm happy I came down and put together a solid second run. I have to build momentum going to Are and kick it up a notch—work my way in there and keep it solid. I didn't want to come into the second run with the approach of "I've got to do something special to get in the top 10." I just want to ski consistently, and the way I have been should be enough. As long as I continue with that kind of stable approach, I'll be fine.

### Vonn Leads USA Podium Sweep

LAKE LOUISE, AB (Dec. 6) – Lindsey Vonn (Vail, CO) reclaimed her title as Queen of the Downhill at Lake Louise on Saturday, winning her 60th Audi FIS Ski World Cup and capping a first-ever U.S. Ski Team podium sweep. At the World Cup dubbed Lake Lindsey, she regained her crown as she pulled out the win by almost a half second. Early-running Stacey Cook (Mammoth Mountain, CA) took the lead and held it until Vonn bumped her into second. Julia Mancuso (Squaw Valley, CA) rounded out the podium in third. It was the best finish in two seasons for all three athletes.

Out of her 60 career World Cup wins, 15 of Vonn's first places have come in Lake Louise and she did it again. Vonn looked fast and strong, keeping her speed up throughout the run and never losing the lead. When she crossed through the finish and looked up at the time, she let out a scream of excitement, thrilled to be back in action. "Every day has gotten better here," Vonn said in the finish. "Today I went a little bit more aggressive than I did yesterday and took some more chances. I'm finally feeling confident going fast again."

It was the first ever all-American podium in alpine World Cup ski racing. It also marked four Americans in the top ten, with Laurenne Ross (Bend, OR) in sixth.

The rest of the Americans had to deal with a dark, snowy course, but had good results. Also coming back from multiple knee surgeries, Alice McKennis (Glenwood Springs, CO) took 18th. Jackie Wiles (Aurora, OR) 37th and Katie Ryan (Aspen, CO) 46th. Julia Ford (Plymouth, NH) did not finish.

The women will look to make more history in tomorrow's super G race, starting at 1:00 p.m. EST, with Universal Sports airing live.

#### Quotes:

#### **Lindsey Vonn**

Every day has gotten better here. Today, I went a little bit more aggressive than I did yesterday and took some more chances. I'm finally feeling confident again going fast. I'm pushing the limits and I want more speed. I haven't had that yet until today

There's been some changing terrain here over the last couple days. Every day is a little bit different. I tried to pay a little more attention to that because obviously you couldn't see it today. The light was really bad, but I know this course really well. It was a matter of looking at the snow conditions and the terrain.

#### Stacey Cook

I always thought this was something possible with our team. I really wanted to be a part of it when it happened. It's a good day to step up. I'm so excited for Lindsey too. It's a cool day.

Sometimes I get intimidated by the thought of racing the whole world. So today, I tried to keep it within our team. We race against our team in training and I tried to keep that same feeling. Today, I just went out there and I knew that there is so much talent in this group, so I felt like I was just racing against them. It took a lot of pressure away from me, so I just let it flow.

I don't think much has changed on the team. We've had ups and we've had downs. I think every team will go through that. It's just unfortunate that our down was in the spotlight of the Olympics. But, we're really great friends and it really helps having Lindsey back and her competitiveness and enthusiasm for this sport. It pushes us and we thrive when we push each other.

After my last podiums here, I took off after that. I didn't get more podiums that year, but I had

consistency, which I hadn't had before. With a little more experience under my belt, I'll have the confidence to keep fighting for podiums the rest of the year.

#### Julia Mancuso

The new team dynamic has made us take a step back and not make training so serious. It's serious because we need to be out there and working on something, but it's not serious because it's not a race. We save all that energy and all those good things we learn while training for race day.

I didn't even watch anyone else's video last night because I watched mine. I realized that I have another gear and that I need to reach that other gear to meet my potential and to do the best I can in this race. Of course, it takes a little bit of luck on how other girls ski. I think a lot of other girls maybe had their best run yesterday, but for us, we were still hungry and wanted more.

It's cool because both of the girls on the podium with me are my age. We're all the same age—born in '84—and we're veterans of the World Cup. We've all been working very hard and I've grown up with both of them. It's an awesome day!

#### Patrick Riml, Alpine Director

Great start for the ladies in Lake Louise yesterday and what a performance today! They got some confidence from yesterday's results and skied incredible today. Sweeping the podium for the first time in U.S. skiing history is amazing. Kudos to the athletes for an unbelievable job on and off the hill and to the staff for providing top preparation and training for the athletes!

### First GS Win for Mikaela Shiffrin

SOELDEN, Austria (Oct. 25) - Olympic champion Mikaela Shiffrin (Eagle-Vail, CO) celebrated the 100 day mark to the World Championshps in her hometown by winning the first Audi FIS Alpine World Cup giant slalom of her career in Soelden. Shiffrin took a narrow .09 second margin over Austria's Anna Fenninger, then came from behind after losing ground mid-course, scorching the bottom flats in the second run to tie Fenninger for the win. Austria's Eva-Maria Brem was third.

### HIGHLIGHTS

- •Mikaela Shiffrin took her first Audi FIS Alpine World Cup giant slalom win, leading the first run and tying with Austria's Anna Fenninger in Soelden.
- •Important Day: Shiffrin took the win on the 100th day out to the start of the FIS World Alpine Ski Championships in her hometown of Vail/Beaver Creek. It was her 10th World Cup win and first non-slalom victory.
- •Soelden Success: Shiffrin became the fourth American to win in Soelden since the opener began in 1993. Lindsey Vonn won in 2011. Ted Ligety has won the last three years. And Bode Miller won in 2003 and 2004.
- •Key to the win: In both runs, Shiffrin's bottom section was the turning point. In the second run she gave up ground through the steep section of the course, but gained it back on the flat lower section of the run heading into the finish.
- •Crucial finish for Julia: Julia Mancuso (Squaw Valley, CA) shook off a 47th starting slot to move up dramatically, finishing 17th. The finish boosted her to 31st in the World Cup Start List as she seeks to regain a top seed position. Megan McJames (Park City, UT) started 54th and finished 26th.
- •Next up: The women head back to the USA for training at the U.S. Ski Team Speed Center at Copper, while the men will run their GS on Sunday. Ted Ligety (Park City, UT) will be gunning towards a fourth straight victory in Soelden.
- •Looking Ahead: The women race again with the season-opening slalom in Levi, Finland Nov. 15, then it's on to Aspen for a Nov. 29-30 giant slalom and slalom.

#### QUOTES Mikaela Sh

Mikaela Shiffrin
It's very helpful to know that I can win GS. I've thought it for so long and believed in myself, but today was the first day where between runs I was like, 'Yeah, I really think I can do this and can get that top step.' I really believed it.

I think the most difficult GS I've had was my first year when I came in last place when I was seven seconds out. That was tough and that got me motivated to try to get to the top step as soon as possible, so it's nice it happened today. Right now I'm still working on GS, but I've come a long way so hopefully I can keep improving.

It feels really good to share first place with Ana, and also be on the podium with Eva, you know they finished the season so strong last season. I couldn't really have a better podium. Fenninger was completely on top in GS last year. She was so fast and so fluid and so much fun to watch that I think it probably shouldn't have gone any other way.







# Fourth and Fifth Graders Ski & Ride for FREE in Pennsylvania! 2014-15



### A Healthy Winter Activity for Families to Enjoy Together

White Haven, PA - September 2014 - Fourth and fifth graders who want to ski or snowboard are fortunate especially if they live in or near Pennsylvania. For the eleventh year, the Pennsylvania Ski Areas Association (PSAA) is making skiing or snowboarding free through their Snowpass program for youths inthose two grade levels.

Skiing and snowboarding offers families the opportunity to exercise outside together during the winter months. A ninety pound youth can burn between two and three hundred calories per hour skiing and/or snowboarding depending on their activity level. Skiing and snowboarding are listed among the activities included in the President's Challenge organized by the President's Council on Fitness, Sports and Nutrition. Children and adults can earn points toward a Presidential Active Lifestyle Award by skiing an snowboarding. All nineteen ski/snowboard resorts across Pennsylvania belong to the Snowpass program

In the Snowpass booklet, each resort makes available coupons for fourth and fifth graders to hit the slope free, up to three times, if accompanied by an adult who purchases a lift ticket. An additional coupon at each resort makes it possible for fourth and fifth graders to take advantage of a beginner lift, lesson, and rental Package free and 50% off a beginner lift, lesson and rental package for the participating adult. "We think it is a great program," said parent Glenn Kirby. "Without the Snowpass, we wouldn't have gone snowboarding at all this winter. Now we are hooked. We are already looking forward to next year a well as when my first grader is in fourth grade."

"We have found that fourth and fifth graders are at the ideal age to learn a new sport with ease and to excel rapidly," said PSAA Executive Director Linda Irvin. "Through the Snowpass program and on-mountain experience, students can see the lessons of their fourth and fifth grade science studies in action (such as water resources at work, animal predator/prey relationships, geology structure, and the physics of lift mechanics)."

The Snowpass booklet is not restricted to residents of Pennsylvania. Any fourth or fifth grade student ca participate by completing a simple applica-

tion and providing a report card or other document verifying they are currently in the fourth or fifth grade. Photos for students also are required. The application can be found on the Pennsylvania Ski Areas Association's Web site at www. skipa.com.

There is a nominal administration/processing fee of \$30 for the Snowpass. There are some basic rules that apply as well as some black-out dates typically around busy holidays. The details also are posted at www.skipa.com. The site lists all participating resorts in Pennsylvania and answers most frequently asked questions. Check the web site for further information, blackout dates and paid adult lift restrictions or call the Pennsylvania Ski Areas Association at 570-443-0963 then ski or ride to your heart's content at any or all of the following resorts. No matter where you live in Pennsylvania or a neighboring state; you'll be within minutes to two hours from a world of fun on the slopes.
