Cold Weather/Snowmakers - Heros of the Slopes

Meghan Trainor's song taught us that it is all about that base. That sentiment rings true for local ski resorts, except they are trying to build a snow base. As the temperatures finally dip below freezing, ski resorts have cranked up the snow making process to ensure skiers, snowboarders, and tubers have optimal conditions to enjoy during the season.

It has been a tough winter for skiing as temperatures have been milder in December, and November but recent fridgid temperatures have provided places like Jack Frost-Big Boulder, Camelback Mountain, Shawnee Mountain, Montage Mountain, Blue Mountain, and Alpine Mountain the ability to establish that base snow.

"We are taking advantage of that recent arctic air to make snow," Mark Daubert, general manager of Jack Frost-Big Boulder said. "We are pumping out tons and tons of snow. Now that the cold air has come in, we are running flat out. We are planning to run 24 hours to add more terrains and slopes."

With December record setting warm temperatures in the rear-view mirror, January has been kinder to the mountains as temperatures have dropped and snowmaking has ramped up. Those efforts are beginning to pay dividends as so many of the local ski resorts are using their upgraded and improved snow making systems to coat the trails and open as many as possible.

Camelback will be making snow around the clock as conditions permit. They have a very robust snow making system. and have put a lot of time, money, and energy into the system. There is a whole science behind it. Because of that they have been able to open trails. There may not be snow on the ground, but they can still put a quality product out there. Camelback Mountain will open January 7.

Jack Frost-Big Boulder are currently both open.

Alpine Mountain will open January 7.

Montage Mountain will open this weekend January 9th.

Shawnee Mountain, thanks to aggressive snowmaking opens January 6 with a mini-

mum of 5 trails open including the top-to-bottom 5,000 foot Pennsylvania Trail .

The mountains and ski resorts have wasted no time getting the snow making process underway as soon as possible. Much of that has to do with the upgrades and improvements they have made to the snow making process. As in so many things in life, technology is getting better. Shawnee Mountain has put that to use by making significant advancements to their ability to produce snow.

"We added more automated snow making, so some of the guns on the trails are controlled through the computer," Jim Tust general manager of Shawnee Mountain said. "The guns can adjust themselves to our parameters in terms of how much mix of air and water are at a given temperature and humidity. The point is they are very efficient."

The goal for all these mountains is to use the positive changes in snow making to cover the trails and terrains as quickly as possible. They are working daily to accomplish it. The optimal temperature for snow creation is in the teens. So over the next few days as the colder air moves in, those temperatures are achievable and the process takes off.

"We know the fire power we have here," Daubert said. "The cold air has finally arrived, so now we will be 100 percent as quickly as possible. We are probably 80 percent currently. "

With the cooperation of Mother Nature, the ski resorts will reach their goal of 100 percent coverage. They have the snow making abilities to do so and are using the advancements in that area to make it happen faster and more efficiently. The plan is in place and they are producing snow at a Usain Bolt pace so the public can enjoy the fruits of their labor.

With the cooperation of Mother Nature and the diligence of the ski resorts, there is significant excitement for President's Day weekend. President's Day weekend offers one of the best ski weekends of the year and the local resorts are preparing to make it as strong as possible.

"All the resorts are open or will open by this weekend," Brian Bosart of the Pocono Vacation Bureau said. "The conditions are very good. So there will be fun events going on for skiing, snowboarding, and tubing.

Check with the ski resorts for the most up-to date ski conditions.

Vonn Wins 4th Straight World Cup

ARE, Sweden (Dec. 12, 2015) – Lindsey Vonn (Vail, CO) scored her 71st World Cup victory, and her first giant slalom victory since 2013, Saturday on a wind-shortened course.

Mikaela Shiffrin (Eagle-Vail, CO) did not start after sustaining a pre-race injury. Shiffrin pulled out of the race with a possible right knee injury sustained during the morning warm up. As a precautionary measure, she is being evaluated further. She has actively engaged in talking about it on her social media.

High winds forced race officials to push the start down to the reserve location – eliminating several gates from the course – as well as causing a 15-minute delay.

"I love racing here in Are under the lights," Vonn said, who won the Are GS in 2012. "This is my second GS win here. It's just been a great season so far, and congratulations to all the other racers as well – so happy."

Behind Vonn, Austria's Eva-Maria Bren was second and Italy's Federica Brignone rounded out the podium in third at 0.35

Highlights:

- Saturday's GS victory was Lindsey Vonn's 71st overall World Cup win.
- It was her first World Cup GS victory sine March 2013 at Maribor
- Mikaela Shiffrin sustained a possible right knee injury warming up prior to the race. She is being further evaluated.



Ligety + Shiffrin Win Coronet Peak Night Slalom

QUEENSTOWN, New Zealand — Ted Ligety (Park City, UT) and Mikaela Shiffrin (Vail, CO) took victories at the Coronet Peak Night Slalom, part of the Audi Quattro Winter Games NZ on Friday night.

The Coronet Peak Night Slalom was an overwhelming success according to Audi quattro Winter Games NZ CEO Arthur Klap, who said organizers never imagined they would have such a stellar international field for the debut event.

"Not only did we have the two world champions here but the rest of the elite field was a who's who of world ski racing," said Klap. "It was incredibly exciting for spectators and has showcased Coronet Peak and the opening of the Games internationally."

It was an all American final for both the women's and men's races with Shif-

frin defeating teammate Paula Moltzan (Lakeville, MN) and Ligety pushing U.S. national slalom champion David Chodounsky (Crested Butte, CO) into second place.

Shiffrin said the head-to-head slalom was a "fantastic way to finish my camp in New Zealand. It was a tough race against Paula who is a very good skier but I am very excited to have won it."

Ligety also claimed he was lucky to beat Chodounsky who was quicker in the first run but had a bad start in the second.

"The dual slalom here at Coronet Peak was a very cool event," said Ligety. "The conditions were great and it was a lot of fun being part of it."

Both Shiffrin and Ligety received \$15,000 cash in the winner-takes-all

The American men were Drew Duffy (Warren, VT), Jared Goldberg (Holladay, UT), Kieffer Christianson (Anchorage, AK), Andrew Weibrecht (Lake Placid, NY), Sam Dupratt (Park City, UT), Mark Engel (Truckee, CA) and Nick Krause (Northboro, MA).

Athletes from all over the world joined VIPs and the local community for the

Winter Games NZ opening, which began with a ski down Coronet Peak's shirtfront by young Queenstown Alpine Ski Team racers carrying flags of the countries represented at the Games. Coronet Peak ski instructors followed with flares lighting up the night sky.

A Maori welcome was followed by a kapa haka performance by a 60-strong group of Queenstown school children before the official part of the ceremony.

In his opening speech Audi quattro Winter Games NZ chairman Sir Eion Edgar said the trust managing the Games had fulfilled its 2009 vision to run a premier event.
